Introduction

The owner of Langhope Rig Wind Farm, Greencoat UK Wind, is contributing £80,000 per annum (index linked) to five local communities. The Fund is arranged into two equal sized Sub-Funds: Sub-Fund A is managed as a single joint fund and provides grants to groups providing activities and services to the communities served by the three community councils of Lilliesleaf, Ashkirk & Midlem; Upper Teviotdale & Borthwick Water and Ettrick & Yarrow. Sub Fund B operates as a devolved fund and block grants are provided to these same three community councils plus an additional two – Hawick & District and Denholm & District.

The overall Fund is held and administered by Foundation Scotland who receive and process applications for Sub-Fund A and support a local Community Panel to make decisions on awards. Foundation Scotland also provides bespoke support and due diligence to each of the five community councils benefitting from Sub-Fund B and to ensure their local distribution is in line with good practice.

The Langhope Rig Sub-Fund A Community Fund Panel makes decisions on how Sub-Fund A is spent, and helps promotes the Fund locally. The Panel comprises three members from each of the three communities of Lilliesleaf, Ashkirk & Midlem; Upper Teviotdale & Borthwick Water and Ettrick & Yarrow. Each area provides one community councillor appointed by the Community Council and two lay community members appointed by an open and transparent process.

Sub-Fund A Overview

In the period from 1 January 2017 to 31 January 2017 11 applications were considered by the Fund at a Panel meeting in March. By the end of the year a further two applications had been received for consideration in early 2018.

The Panel made 9 awards to 9 different groups although in due course one award was withdrawn because the project could not progress. Two applications were rejected; one was rejected because the Panel felt there was not enough local benefit being shown for the area; and one was rejected as it did not fit sufficiently with the priorities of the Fund. £45,276 (54% of Fund income) was awarded to projects while 0.09% (£78.05) was used for Panel members travel expenses and venue hire for Panel meetings. The balance carried forward to 2017-18 was £24,052.11

The average award over the report period was £5,659.50. The lowest award was £1,466 (made to Yarrowford Hall Association) and the two highest awards were both for £10,000 for capital build projects (to Ettrick and Yarrow Community Development Company and to Teviothead Hall). The total value of projects funded from Sub-Fund A was £64,852 giving a leverage ratio of 30%; for every £0.70 awarded from the Fund, a further £0.30 was raised from elsewhere. See Table 1 below.

Projects in the Lilliesleaf, Ashkirk & Mildem area were awarded 4 awards totalling £17,010 (37% of all funds awarded), in the Ettrick & Yarrow area 3 projects received £18,266 (41% of all funds awarded), and in Upper Teviot & Borthwick Water one project was awarded £10,000 (22% of all funds awarded).

What Difference is the Langhope Rig Fund Making?

Foundation Scotland is aligning community benefit grants from the Langhope Rig Fund to six Scotland wide themes with associated outcomes. We are doing this on a pilot basis to better capture and describe the impact of awards. The themes are:

- Improve life skills, education, employability and enterprise
- Maximise ability to strengthen community cohesion and build social capacity
- Promote reduction of isolation and disadvantage and access to local services
- Advance people's physical and mental health, wellbeing and safety
- Connect people with the arts, culture and heritage
- Transform access to, and engagement with, the environment and public spaces.

The themes have an associated set of outcomes which Foundation Scotland attributes the grant to. The current data for the Langhope Rig Fund demonstrates that across both sub-funds, grant awards are predominantly aligned to the theme of *maximising the ability of a group or organization to strengthen community cohesion and build social capacity*. (Figure 1) and the corresponding outcomes are achieving change in four key areas: improving community facilities and improving the community working together (85% of funds distributed), improving the quality of the local environment and

public space (10% of funds distributed) and promoting opportunities for creativity (6% of funds distributed).

Figure1: Allocation of Langhope Rig grants for the 1 January – 31 December period to Scotland wide impact themes





Figure2: Outcomes attributed to Langhope Rig grants for the period 1 January – 31 December 2017



We are testing this framework through 2018. It will then be refined to then enable us to collect more qualitative and quantitative information that is meaningful for clients, for Panels and their wider communities and also for Foundation Scotland.

Sub – Fund A

The eight awards were primarily for capital works to support the improvement of community spaces. Six of the eight were to support improvements to community buildings and two of the awards were improving external spaces or access routes. These projects have wide reach into communities as these spaces meet the needs of a wide array of different groups and individuals.

Completion reports are required to be submitted by awardees. Generally awards are for projects that are planned to complete within 12 months of receiving an award. Foundation Scotland allows three months from this completion date for the return of reports, before writing to awardees to chase outstanding reports. At the time of writing (March 2018) only one report was outstanding. Table 2 below highlights the difference grants have made to progress and complete specific project activity for the benefit of the community.

The grant fully funded the project which proceeded in the given time-frame. The swing was in position by mid-June and the project came in slightly under budget. The playpark now provides more play options and the swing has been popular all summer. It benefits approximately 30 children as well as their parents and carers.

The Land Fund was waiting for a decision from FES before making an award so everything is now on hold until the refusal notice is either upheld or over-turned. In the meantime, the boardwalk continues to deteriorate so it is very frustrating. FS has requested a further update in April.
