Halkirk District Wind Farm Community Funds

In partnership with the Halkirk District Community Council, Foundation Scotland administers three of the local community benefit funds from local wind farms, for the residents of Halkirk District. These wind farms are Achlachan, Bad á Cheò and Halsary.

Foundation Scotland is an independent charity with expertise in grant making and provides governance and administrative support to the Funds under contract to the wind farm owners. The Foundation's costs for this service are paid from the Fund.

Decisions on awards are made by a local Funding Panel, comprising up to 14 volunteers from the community.

2023 Fund activity

During 2023 the three Funds have...



Awarded 42 grants ranging from £500 to £30,000 totalling £167,181...



including 23 awards to community groups totalling £134,858



.. and 19 awards to people learning to drive totalling £9,500...



... and 15 awards to people doing other training courses totalling £22,823.

Awards Made in 2023

The Panel makes awards from three Funds, collectively these are known as the ABH Funds. During 2023, 23 awards were made, these were allocated in a reasonably balanced way to each of the three Funds with 6 awards made by the Achlachan Wind Farm Community Fund, 6 by the Bad a Cheo Wind Farm Fund and 7 by the Halsary Windfarm Community Benefit Fund. There were also three larger awards, and these awards were split between the three Funds.

Bad á Cheò Education and Training Awards

The purpose of the bursaries is to improve people's opportunities for employment. Anyone aged over 16 who lives within the Halkirk District area can apply for short courses or multi-year courses which they can see potential for employment in.

Costs might include course fees, course books, study aids, equipment. Please note travel, subsistence and accommodation costs will only be considered for people aged 16-25, and in the first instance students should check whether they are eligible for free bus travel.
